Here is the disconnect between Corporate Assumptions and Youth Reality.

THE PERCEPTION

It's Not "Boring" – It's "Unsafe"

The Corporate Assumption: Young people find our industry uninteresting or difficult to understand.

The Youth Reality: They view it as toxic, elitist, and unwelcoming.

Key Words they used: "Condescending," "Isolating," "Exhausting," "White-collar."

The Killer Quote: "They imagined a competitive environment where... people would 'just talk down to you because they perceive themselves as superior.'"

THE MOTIVATION

Not a Poster on the Wall, but the Weight on Their Shoulders

The Corporate Assumption: Motivation is about passion, curiosity, or perks.

The Youth Reality: Motivation is about survival, family obligation, expectations and breaking cycles.

The Hard Truth: Many students are effectively financial contributors to their households. They aren't looking for a "career path"—they are looking to "keep the lights on."

The Killer Quote: "Her motivation isn't an abstract career goal... it's a lot of pressure to find a decent job... because of the financial pressures."

THE BARRIER

Your "Standard" Hiring Process is a Broken Gate

The Corporate Assumption: The CV reflects the candidate; the interview reveals the character.

The Youth Reality: Standard processes filter out culturally diverse talent.

Cultural Context: For many Pasifika youth, presenting as "shy" or "introverted" is actually a sign of respect. Asking them to "sell themselves" contradicts their cultural values.

The Killer Quote: "A CV might look s*** doesn't mean the person is. It might mean that they lack that support system to present better. Doesn't mean that they're not going to be your best employee."
